Charles is a 1974 graduate of the University of South Carolina with a bachelor's degree in political science and a 1976 doctorate in law. He is a general practice lawyer.

Charles has served as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Kershaw County Vocational Education Foundation, Inc. for thirty (30) years. He is on the Board of the Historic Mapping Congress, is Chairman of the Battle of Camden Preservation Project Advisory Council and appeared in a PBS documentary on that Revolutionary War battle.
